Board of Equalization.

BROKEN BOW, July 15, 9:00 A. M.

The county board met, pursuant to adjournment of the 17th day of June, as a board of equalization, all members present.

Motion was made and carried to reconsider the action taken by the special committee appointed to investigate the application of F. M. Simmonds, at the June 16th meeting of the board of equalization, in regard to the village levy on different tracts of land in Ansley.

We recommend that the application of F. M. Simmonds be granted and the clerk be, and is, hereby instructed to charge village tax as requested in petition.

Motion made and carried to accept and adopt the report.

Motion made and carried that F. L. Haycock be cited to appear before the board of equalization to show cause why the assessment on lots No. 11, 12, 13 and 14, in block No. 6, original town of Callaway, on which the mill dam is situated, should not be raised.

Motion made and seconded that we confirm the action of the county assessor in assessing the forty five head of fat cattle of Jul Kay to him. Motion carried.

The petition of land owners of Mason City, in regard to certain tracts of land in the Village of Mason City, was referred to a special committee composed of B. P. Morris and Geo. Greenwalt. The special committee, as above, made the following report: "That the petition of parties (as above stated) be granted, and that the county clerk be, and is, so instructed not to make a village levy on said tracts."

The county assessor made the following statement: "I vote 'Yes' as to the land included in the order of the court, and 'No' as to the land not included in that order."

Motion was made and carried to adjourn until the 8th day of August, at 9:30 a. m.

Board of Supervisors.

The board of supervisors met in regular session at the court house in Broken Bow, on July 11, 1905, at 9:00 o'clock a. m. Present and answering to roll call: Arthur, Greenwalt, Thorpe, Fenimore, Schneringer, Fonda and Morris.

The chairman appointed the following committees to check up the county offices: Thorpe and Fenimore, for register of deeds' office; Greenwalt and Fonda, for county clerk's office; Morris and Schneringer, for clerk of the district court's office.

The members spent the afternoon in checking up the different offices. Motion made and carried to adjourn until Thursday morning, for the purpose of inspecting the poor farm, on Wednesday.

THURSDAY, July 13, 9:30 A. M.

Board met pursuant to adjournment, all members present. Minutes approved. The chairman appointed Morris and Schneringer as a committee to check up the county judge's office, and Greenwalt and Fonda to check up the sheriff's office.

The different committees spent the balance of the day in checking the different offices. Motion made and carried to adjourn until 9:30 a. m., Friday.

FRIDAY, July 14, 9:30 A. M.

Minutes approved. The different committees then took up the regular work.

The road committee made the following report on the James Gouley road: "We recommend the petition be granted from station No. 1 to station No. 5, thence in a southwesterly direction to a lot center of one-half of section No. 11 15 17, then south 80 rods, thence west 80 rods to station No. 11; and from station No. 13 to station No. 22, from station No. 22 to the northwest corner of the ne 1/4 of section 22 15 17, thence south on

Also that the petition of W. A. Ellingson, et al., for establishment and vacation of roads, in town 19, range 19, be rejected and the remonstrance be granted.
