Mr. Rankin having had a homestead of 160 acres under the old law sought to increase his land interests by filing on three quarters of government land adjoining his original homestead, in compliance with the provisions of the Kinkaid section homestead law. A number of witnesses on both sides were examined to ascertain the true status of the case.
