### Division Lines.

The division convention was held at Ansley last Monday and a four county cut was agreed upon. The lines places Broken Bow in the north-west part of Custer county. The county, if the lines were adopted is twenty miles wide at the south end including townships 13 and 4 miles in 14. The north end including two miles in 14 and all of 15 and 16 is 24 miles wide.

Arbor county which is proposed for the south-west was not the least bashful and went in for a big slice. On the south its lines includes all territory, two miles west of range 19 and its north west corner extends two miles into town 18 range 25 and zigzags east to range 20 at a point three miles south-west of Broken Bow. The line separating Noble in the north-west and Oyama in the north-east is the range line between 20 and 21 to the Middle Loup, from which point the river is the line to the north-west.

The boundaries are so arranged as to place Callaway, Merna, Sargent and Ansley in the center of their respective territories with the view of them getting the county seats.

The area of the south-east is sixteen townships and thirty two sections. The north-west quarter has seventeen townships and twenty three sections, the north-east fourteen townships and sixteen sections and the south-west twenty three townships and one section.

This is Brega's county which is six townships larger than the next largest.

### County Matters.

The county board completed its work as a board of equalization last week.

The total valuation of the county as returned by the state board of equalization gives a total of \$4,160,958.63. The total valuation last year was \$3,884,289.00. This gives an increase in valuation of \$276,669.63. The state board increased the valuation over that found by the as-

sessors \$85,000. The increase made by the state board is as follows:

The countyboard increased the county levy to 11 mills which is three mills higher than last year. This will raise \$45,770.54 for general fund purposes, where there were but \$31,074.31 last year. It makes a difference in round numbers of \$1,469.00.

One of the attractions at the County fair to be held at Broken Bow on September 12, 13, 14 and 15, will be a series of ball games. Fifty dollars to go to the winning team in each game. The strongest teams in the county will compete and it is an assured fact that this feature of the amusement program will create an unusual interest. The ball games will take place just before noon and will not interfere with the mammoth afternoon program of racing and sport.

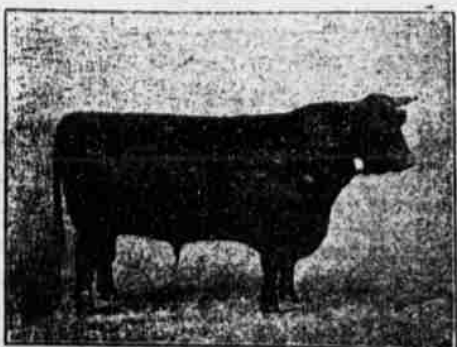

### DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION.
