2. We commend the efforts of the executive officers of our state and especially the position of our Attorney General Norris Brown in his efforts to break up and destroy illegal combinations in restraining trade, such as the coal trust, the lumber trust, the grain trust, the elevator trust, and all other illogal combinanations formed for the purpose depressing the prices of the products of the farm and the range and we pledge to the executive officers of our state our earnest support and hearty cooperation in their efforts to establish an absolutely fair deal between the producer and the consumer of the products of the state.

3. In county matters we demand a days work for a days pay, an absolute honest administration of the affairs of the courty by the officers elected for that purpose, and we pledge the nominess of this convention to labor for a just and fair and economical administration of the affairs of the county that may be entrusted to their hands.

4. 
