The reading of the resolutions was by J. J. Tooley and upon his motion they were adopted. The order of business was then taken up and on motion an informal ballot was taken on candidate for county clerk. The informal ballot gave Alvin Daily, 70; Geo. Headley, 45; Joe Osborn, 23; Phil Campbell, 7; J. T. Arthur, 18; Joe Hiatt, 21; Joe Bradburn, Messers Osbourn, Hiatt, Campbell

and Bradburn declined. A committee appeared at this juncture of the proceedings and asked an audience with the convention, but the chair held that a report could not be received from accurately and scientifically when the democratic committee until the vote needed. ordered had been completed. Moved by Beal that the report of the committee from the democratic convention be heard as soon as the balloting for county clerk was completed. The motion carred with

On the first formal ballot Shinn received 112; Dean, 18; Beal, 34; Rhodes, 6; Moore, 12; Gandy, 9 Gandy changed his vote to Beal. Shinn having received the majority vote was declared the nominee.
