is predicted that most of them will. Attorney-General Brown and Senator Burkett were among the first to announce their intentions. As the resolutions passed by the convention did not demand the return of passes held, but required the next legislature to pass a law prohibiting free transportation, the state officers are to be commended for their prompt action in the matter.

The republican party, in its state convention placed itself quite squarely in line with the national administration under the courageous, able and wise administration of President Roosevelt. Its instructions to the senators and congressmen of this state are plain. They cannot be misunderstood. Neither can the action of the convention be misunderstood with reference to the nomination of Judge Letton. There was clearly a combination of Union Pacific and Burlington forces to make either Ames or Duffie. It did not go. It failed of fruition largely because among the delegates throughout the great convention hall there was a disposition to throw off the collar and cast aside the yoke of railroad domination and dictation. It was quite a plain dictation that the pernicious activity of the railroad managers had gone too far. And it failed because that sentiment found a leader in Senator Burkett of the Lancaster delegation when he stood in the way of the delivery

by the Burlington to the Union Pacific of the Lancaster delegation for Duffie, though every railroad controlled delegate in the convention was shouting at Senator Burkett to sit down, which defiance of the machine made Senator Burkett a lot of new friends in every section of the state. A notable beginning was made for a better condition of affairs in the party and there is every indication that it will be

carried further and continued.—Grand Island Independent.

The Republican State Convention.

His nomination was clearly a victory over corporation influence in state politics for the common people.

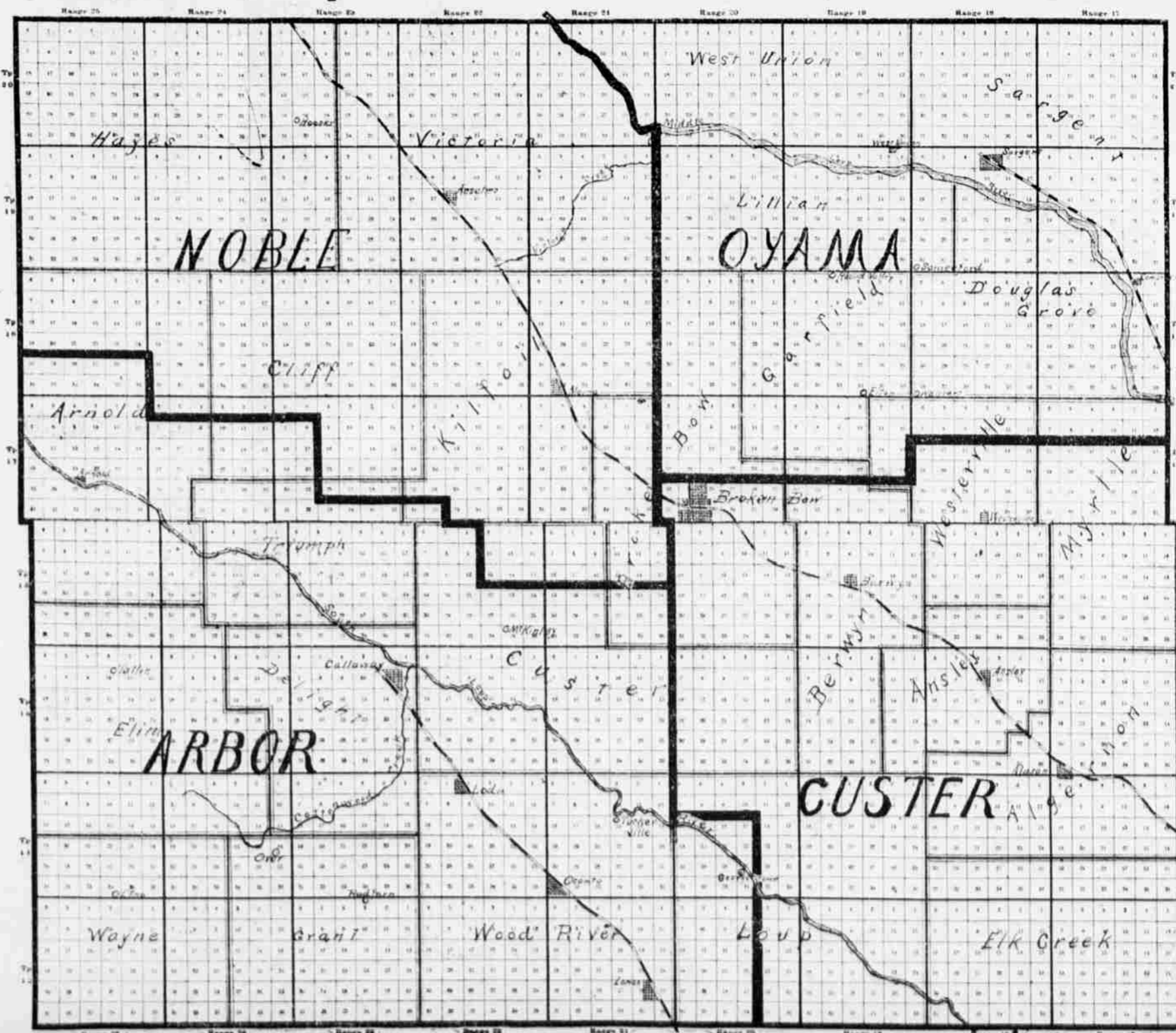
The platform strongly endorses President Roosevelt's policy in his peace negotiations, his views on corporation control.
