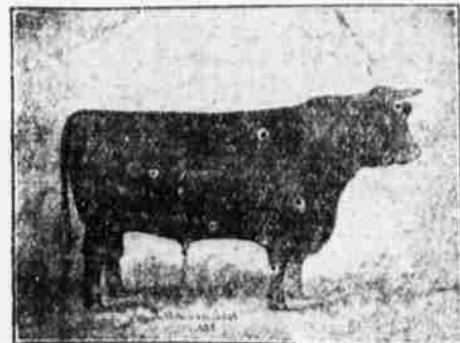
L. F. Rapp took charge of the north side meat market Monday which he recently purchased from J. M. Bates.

A Commercial Course Endorsed.

A public meeting was held at the Court House last night to consider the interests of our city schools. The question of inducing the boys, who so generally drop out of school after finishing the eighth or tenth grade to continue was the issue. Whether the adding of a commercial course for those who do not care to take up the Latin course or prepare for the State University would have the desired effect was generally discussed. A motion prevailed endorsing the proposition and authorized the school board to add a commercial course at once, if practical. It was thought arrangements might be made to add the commercial course the first of November, but that matter was left to the judgment of the school board as well as all other matters of detail.
