The Broken Bow Roller Mills.

This institution, which is owned and operated by S. J. Lonergan, is one of the best business houses in Broken Bow in the matter of public benefit. This is not generally known yet it is true. Mr. Lonergan continues to do business in a quiet way twelve months in the year and most of the time the mill grinds along. We of Broken Bow are so accustomed to its continual whirle we do not think anything about it, except when it shuts down for repairs. We are lost when we fail to hear the whistle morning, noon and night as it notes the time of day for all within its sound for miles around.

It was a surprise to us as we were looking around for an item of news Tuesday, to learn of the amount of business turned out annually by the Broken Bow Mills. We did not see Mr. Lonergan in person so we are not able to give the total amount of business transacted annually in dollars and cents.

But we did learn of one item which gives something of the importance of the mill to the farming community. We were reliably informed that the mill has shipped out from Broken Bow within the past twelve months eighty-three cars of manufactured breadstuf and feed. This is more than was shipped out by both the elevators combined. It approximately amounts to 3,000,000 pounds. When the further fact of the amount of flour and chopped feed he sells on the Broken Bow market is taken into consideration something of the enormity of the Broken Bow Roller Mills may be conjectured.

The flour and feed manufactured is produced from grain raised by the farmers of Custer county. Mr. Lonergan only buys the best quality of grain, but he generally pays two or three cents more on the bushel than the market price as an inducement to the farmers to bring him their best. The manufacturing and shipping of this amount of stuff only represents Mr. Lonergan's side of the question, but when it is remembered that the grain must first be bought of the farmers the importance of the mill to the

farming community can not be appreciated.
