We believe strictly in the principle of equality before the law as applied to the transportation business, and, therefore demand immediate relief through the enforcement of existing laws, or through amendatory legislation from the payboth in the state and in the nation.

With unbounded confidence in the in tegrity and statesmanship of President Roosevelt, we heartily approve his recent utterances in which he says: "I believe that all corporations engaged in interstate commerce should be under the supervision of the national government. I do not believe in taking steps hastely and it may be that all that is necessary in the immediate future is to pass an interstate commerce bill conferring upon some branch of the executive government the power of effective action to remedy the abuses in connection with railway transportation."

We request and demand of our repre sentatives in congress active and harmonious co-operation with President Roosevelt along these lines, to the end that corporate rapacity, extortion and abuses may be subdued and abolished, and the sovereignty of the people over corporations fully, promptly and per-manently established.

Believing that the nearer the control of public affairs can be brought to the people, the better the result will be, we declare ourselves in favor of a direct primary law governing the nomination of all public officers.
