Fonda Renominated.

At the republican supervisors convention held at Oconto last Saturday week, A. Fonda was renominated. Mr. Fonda is one of the best business men on the county board and we predict his reelection by an increased majority.

Mob Law at Mullen.

O. F. Hamilton, a lawyer at Mullen, telegraphed District Attorney Baxter at Omaha Tuesday noon for protection against a mob.
The telegram stated "office smashed, life threatened, mob signs of execution." District Attorney Baxter phoned Gov. Mickey about the matter and he promised to take immediate steps for the protection of Hamilton.
It appears that Hamilton is the principle witness against the cattle men of Hooker county, where cases are filed in the U. S. Circuit Court against cattlemen for illegal fencing, embracing 100,000 acres of government land. The Governor wired Sheriff Rector of Hooker county to furnish protection to Hamilton. He also wired the county attorney at Mullen to see that all persons implicated are arrested and prosecuted.
At this writing the Governor has not ordered the militia, but in case the militia is needed Co. M of Broken Bow will be called out.
Mullen people say the report is exaggerated and that threats against him were not made because of his connection with the illegal fencing, but of his every ability to stir up strife in the community. They concede the windows of his office were smashed and he had been given notice to leave by October first.
It is claimed that F. M. Cudabe, a Justice of the Peace, is his partner and that Hamilton stirs up strife and has the cases taken before Cudabe for trial and both are very unpopular in the community.

How Money Grows in America.

A striking sign of the prosperity of the American people during the past year is given by the figures showing the position of the national banks on August 25, as compared with that on September 6, 1904. These figures have just been made public by the comptroller of the currency.
They show that the banks prospered, for their total resources grew from not quite \$7,000,000,000 nearly \$7,500,000,000 or nearly 7 per cent. But they also show that the people prospered more rapidly than the banks, for individual deposits increased from not quite \$4,000,000,000 to nearly \$4,500,000,000 or more than 10 per cent.—Chicago Inter Ocean.
