How Money Grows in America

How Money Grows in America.

A striking sign of the prosperity of the American people during the past year is given by the fightes showing the position of the national banks on August 25, as compared with that on September 6, 1954. These figures have just been made public by the comptroller of the currency.

They show that the banks prospered, for their total resources grew from not quite \$7,000,000,000 to nearly \$1.50,000,000 or nearly; per cent. But they also show that the people prospered more rapidly than the banks for individual deposits increased from not quite \$1,500,000,000 to nearly \$1.000,000,000 or more than 10 per cent. *Chicago Inter Ocean.
