**A School Entertainment.**  
 A school entertainment was given at the Goheen school house last Saturday night, which was followed with a basket supper. Miss Mable Hannawald of Merina, is the teacher in this district, it being her first term. The success of the splendid program presented is due wholly to her energies and the assistance of her pupils.  
 The object of the entertainment and basket supper was to raise funds to buy an organ for the school, the old one having seen its best days. A large attendance was present and a most social and entertaining evening was spent.  
 After rendering the program, which was highly creditable to the teacher and pupils, the entertainment was changed to an auction sale. Thirty-eight baskets had been contributed by the women and girls of the community to be sold to the highest bidder. The bidding was sharp and

started from the first. Only one basket sold as low as \$1.00. They averaged nearly \$2.00. The amount realized from the sale was \$77. The teachers basket sold last and brought \$3.50. The social time followed when the owner of the basket and the purchaser were given an opportunity to enjoy the sweet meats together. The money raised was more than is required to purchase the new organ and the parents and pupils are much pleased over the success as well as grateful to all who assisted in making the event such a grand success.

**Great is Nebraska:**  
 Nebraska is a rich state, richer perhaps in possibilities for the future than in visible assets, even if the returns on railroad property were up to the standard of what disinterested parties would call equitable and just in comparison with the assessment of other properties. Nebraska is known to be a state of magnificent geographical proportions. A passenger train crossing the state from east to west between sunrise and sunset even in the long days of summer has to go some. It has ninety-nine counties, the largest of which contains more square miles than the state of Rhode Island, still under our system of assessing property of all kinds at one-fifth of its selling value, the impression is carried abroad that the commonwealth is poor.  
 In comparison look at the little state of New Jersey with its twenty-one small counties. The most insignificant of the lot turns in a property value of \$10,794,344, while the sum total for the whole state reaches the enormous sum of \$1,153,682,961. Something more than a fourth of the grand total is levied in Essex county where the great manufactories

are located, but the returns from elsewhere make the figures emanating from the richer counties of Nebraska look like an agricultural invoice after a grasshopper raid.—Lincoln Journal.

**Agricultural Society Meeting.**  
 The annual meeting of the Custer County Agricultural Society was held Tuesday afternoon in the office of County Superintendent, L. H. Jewett presiding. The report of the secretary was read and approved. The records showed the gate receipts to be in round numbers, \$1,808, which was \$210 more than was received last year and \$56 less than was received two years ago. In addition to this \$629 had been contributed by the business men of Broken Bow in subscription.  
 The treasurer's account shows a balance of \$917, against which are warrants drawn for expense and premiums to the amount of \$784. A few outstanding bills not yet presented will leave only a small balance from the proceeds of 1905.  
 This still leaves an indebtedness of \$300 on the fair grounds which will be due in April. The question of meeting this debt and to provide for better and more suitable buildings for the grounds was generally discussed. The general impression was that a subscription of \$2 from each of the life members might be secured to pay off the mortgage on the grounds, which would give the board of trustees an opportunity hereafter to use whatever surplus might accumulate in improving the grounds.  
 On motion the retiring president, L. H. Jewett, and E. R. Purcell were elected as a committee to present needs of the society to the life members with the view of raising the \$300 necessary to liquidate the mortgage.  
 On motion the price of single admission for adults was made 35 cents and children between 10 and 15 years of age 15 cents. All children under ten years free. A season ticket good for the fair, \$1.00. The family ticket was abolished.  
 The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:  
 W. A. George, President; G. O. Waters, Vice-President; A. J. VanAntwerp, Secretary; Alpha Morgan, Treasurer.  
 The following trustees were elected for the ensuing term:  
 L. W. Wilson of Merina, Fred W. Hayes of Broken Bow, R. E. Brega of Callaway.  
 The following resolutions were presented by W. W. Cowles:  
 RESOLVED, That we, the members of the Custer County Association do hereby express our confidence in, and respect for our President, L. H. Jewett, E. R. Purcell, Secretary; and Alpha Morgan, Treasurer; for their very able and untiring labors to make our County Fair a grand success for the year of 1905. Therefore, be it  
 RESOLVED, That a copy of these resolutions be spread on the records of the Custer County Fair Association.  
 They were unanimously adopted.
