the candidates of the respective parties for the great offices that the people are to fill. And the members of the party at large have no more to do with the making of the nominations for these municipal offices than the children you find playing in the streets."

**Four Officers Ineligible.**  
 The State Journal of last Friday states that "four county superintendents-elect are ineligible to hold the office to which they were elected, according to reports received at the office of State Superintendent McBrien. He declines to announce the names of any of them. Miss Lackey of Scotts Bluff county and Mr. Coney of Stanton county, the former a democrat and the latter a republican, have failed to secure first grade certificates and will be notified by Superintendent McBrien that they are ineligible to that office, the new law requiring candidates to hold a first grade teacher's certificate in force at the time of their election.

If official reports filed in the state superintendent's office are not amended, two other successful candidates will be informed that they are ineligible. The latter two are both men, holding office in the eastern part of the state, one in a county north of the Platte river and one south of the river. They have certified to themselves, and this the attorney general and Mr. McBrien assert is unlawful. Mr. McBrien will not announce the names of the men until he gives them an

opportunity to be heard. As in the other cases, one is a democrat and one a republican. In the Scotts Bluff and Stanton county cases the incumbents, one a republican and one a democrat, will doubtless hold over one year at least, but in the other cases it is the opinion of attorneys that the two men who hold office and who were elected but who certified to their own qualifications, cannot hold over. If the new law is held constitutional they cannot hold over because they are not qualified. They do not possess what the state superintendent and attorney general regard as valid first grade county certificates. There is nothing in the law concerning the right of a county superintendent to issue to himself a teacher's certificate and it is regarded as certain that one or both of the officers who so certified will bring suit in court to maintain their offices. This is regarded doubly certain from the fact that many are of the opinion that the law defining the qualifications for this office is unconstitutional."

**ORFINANCE NO.**  
 An ordinance granting permission and authority to Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railway Company, its successors, and assigns, including its Lessor, Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad Company, to construct, maintain and operate a railroad track on North Railway Street, in Railroad Addition to the City of Broken Bow, from the East side of North Fifth Avenue to the west side of North Seventh Avenue, over across North Seventh Avenue, over and across the alley in Block One Hundred One (101), of said Railroad Addition, and across the street situated on the west side of Block One Hundred and One (101).  
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BROKEN BOW:  
 SECTION 1. That permission and authority be and hereby are granted to Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railway Company, its successors and assigns, including Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad Company, its lessor, to lay down, construct, operate and maintain a single railroad track on and along North Railway Street, in Railroad Addition to the City of Broken Bow as surveyed, platted and recorded, from the east line of North Fifth Avenue to the west line of North Seventh Avenue, and over and across North Seventh Avenue, and the alley in block one hundred and one (101), of said addition, and across the street situated on the west side of said block one hundred and one (101).  
 SECTION 2. The rights and privileges hereby granted are so granted upon the condition that said named Railway Company shall construct, and maintain, on Fifth Avenue, a suitable grade crossing over its said track for the convenience of the public and suitable for all traffic over and along said avenue, and also construct and maintain on Fifth Avenue and on Sixth Avenue suitable gutters or waterways for the discharge of surface water over, and across the line of road so constructed as the same may be necessary.  
 SECTION 3. The City of Broken Bow hereby waives and releases into said Railway Company, its successors and assigns, including Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad Company, its Lessor, all damages, and claims for damages, that may or shall hereafter accrue to it growing out of the construction, and hereafter in the use and operation by said named Railway Company, of the railroad track hereinbefore described.  
 SECTION 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.  
 Passed and adopted this 15th day of November, A. D. 1905.
