Division Superintendent to Locate at Omaha.

John Russel, division superintendent of the Missouri Pacific railroad, it is announced will move his headquarters from Atchison, Kansas, to Omaha, Nebraska, and that the western division will be divided, making the Nebraska lines north of Atchison one division. The move will be made December 1. This may not mean much for Nebraska, yet it would indicate that Nebraska territory is becoming more important to the company and the extension of the lines of this road may be looked for in the near future. The immediate extension of the Prosser branch to Broken Bow is the move in which we are just now mostly interested.

A Laudable Enterprise.

C. G. Nieman of the Rosedale Nursery at Fremont is in the city with the view of interesting the people in a vegetable garden and green house similar to the Fremont plant, where from \$75,000 to \$100,000 worth of business is done annually. Mr. Nieman has visited several towns in the state and one in Wyoming, looking for a location. This town and the one in Wyoming are the only two points that he made known the object of his visit.

He informs us that if he can have sufficient backing here to assure the hearty cooperation of the community, he will put in a steam plant and cover about 100,000 feet with glass. A plant of those dimensions would of necessity employ a large amount of labor and require the disbursement of a large amount of money in this vicinity annually. Further than that it would enable the people of Broken Bow to have vegetables in the winter season at about one fourth the cost that we are now compelled to pay.

Mr. Nieman would require about five acres of land, conveniently located to the town in addition to his green house which would be located conveniently in the city.

Should the public manifest a sufficient interest, Mr. Nieman will ship in his material this winter and have the plant in operation by March 1, 1906.

Broken Bow and the Missouri Pacific.

There has always been a desire of the people of Broken Bow and community to have the Missouri Pacific extend its road from Prosser to Broken Bow. It is now currently reported the M. P. Railroad contemplates extending its line in the near future from Prosser to Shelton, a town located in the south-east corner of Buffalo county. Shelton is on an air line from Prosser to Broken Bow. Shelton is about twenty-five miles from the South Loup, where it passes out of Custer county. The route is an ideal one for a railroad. After reaching the Loup Valley a line could be projected to Broken Bow up the Box Elder with small expense. For a number of years Kearney has been trying to have the M. P. officials extend the road from Prosser to Kearney but without success. As a matter of fact there is nothing for the company to gain by doing so. The M. P. railroad is owned by the same company as the U. P., which main line passes through Kearney. The only object in extending to Shelton is to obtain an outlet to the north-west, as it intersects with the U. P. at that point. The Kearney Hub in discussing the extension of the M. P. railroad from Prosser, which is only ten miles south-east of Shelton says:

"Those who have investigated the matter are convinced that it is not the intention of the Missouri Pacific to build to Kearney. There are many reasons for believing this to be true, one of the principle ones being that officers of the company have on various occasions stated to those intimately acquainted with them, that the contemplated line was through Shelton and not through this city. Such action upon the part of the Missouri Pacific would be disastrous to Shelton, which of necessity depends altogether upon local trade, and would at the same time be a black eye to Kearney."

Broken Bow and the country along the route between here and Shelton are greatly in need of a competing line of railroad such as the Missouri Pacific would furnish and the REPUBLICAN desires to urge the business men of Broken Bow to wake up to the situation and take steps to secure this road. The Kearney Hub further states that "there is a way to prevent the Missouri Pacific from building from Prosser to the north-west and that is for Kearney to build a line from Kearney to Prosser to connect with the M. P. and it urges that it be done at once before it is too late."

This would indicate that the road has determined to build toward Broken Bow and that the only hopes Kearney has to prevent it is to build a connecting line from Kearney to Prosser.

If this is the real situation steps should be taken at once by the people of Broken Bow, Deer Creek, Box Elder and the South Loup to encourage the officers of the M. P. in their contemplated extension to the north-west. It is a matter that should be taken up at once by the Business Men's Association of the city. The Hub says further that "there is but small doubt but that the plans for the lines above referred to will be finally adopted within a very short time and Kearney's interests require that the city's representatives be heard before such action is taken."

As Broken Bow interests are equal to those of Kearney the reasoning is equally applicable to Broken Bow. The situation demands prompt action. Will we wake up to the situation or shall we continue in our Van Winkle sleep?

U. P. Will Extend its Line From Callaway to Calloway. It is reported by Callaway that U. P.

railroad surveyors arrived at Callaway last Saturday and commenced to set stakes along the old survey, that was one time graded for several miles towards Arnold. This move is a confirmation of the REPUBLICAN's report some six weeks ago that the K. & B. H. branch of the U. P. would be extended late this fall or early next spring as far as Arnold. How much farther the extension may be pushed is only a matter of conjecture. Should the Black Hills be made the objective point it is possible the extension may continue on next year. At any rate the people of Arnold and vicinity are to be congratulated on the prospects of at least one railroad in the near future.

Should the B. & M. extend a branch from Broken Bow to Bridgeport in compliance with articles of incorporations recently filed with the State Auditor, Arnold will stand a fair chance of getting a cross road in the near future.

Dr. Mary Parks Cannot Come.

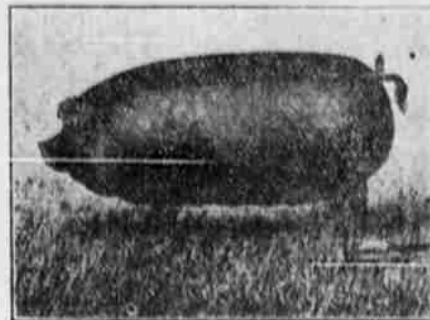

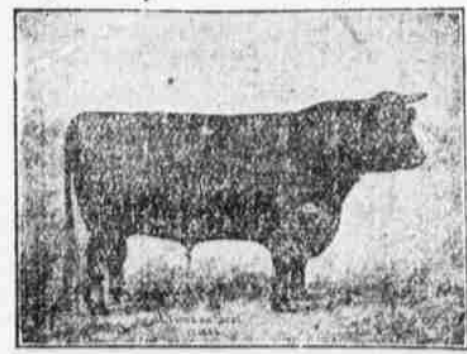
