Peter Beck of Georgetown was in the city Monday. He remembered this office with a friendly call. He brought up a load of goods for Joe Remington which were shipped to Dunning where Mr. Remington has located recently.

We learn from Alfred Cooper of Ryno, that his sister's husband, Anton Boehm, formerly of this county was recently killed accidentally in a coal mine in Kansas. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. at Callaway and his remains were shipped to Callaway for burial. Mrs. Boehm will return to Kansas and dispose of their property when she will return to Custer county.

Noah Clinebell, who moved to a farm on Spring Creek last March returned to Broken Bow last week having sold his machinery and crop. The corn was estimated in the field at 5,730 bushels and he threshed 1,600 bushels of oats. Twenty-three acres of his corn averaged 44 bushels to the acre and 11 1/2 acres averaged 42 1/2 bushels. He cleared over \$200 a month the nine months he was on the farm and started in without any means, in fact he says he owed more than his property would have brought, but he milked about twenty cows through the summer and marketed the cream which helped him out on expenses. He bought the John Kennedy residence property west of Sixth Avenue for which he paid \$2,700. The property includes a new frame house, barn and block of land.
