Who is Jesus? (Continued from Supplement.) friendly to genuine "piety" but many sane people of today have come to detest hypocrisy wherever they find it and that is the extent of their "implacable hostility."

One other matter we must refer to and that is the Contemptuous fling with which he closes his remarkable article.

He speaks of these people whose strongest point in their faith is doubt. We remark, that if to believe in a God who is present in all parts of his universe is doubt, we are guilty; if to believe that he is the Father of all spirits is doubt, we are guilty. If to believe that God's activities are ceaseless and always have been, is doubt, we are guilty. If to believe the declarations that Jesus makes is doubt, we are guilty.

But we must say that Jesus says nothing about the trinity, about the atonement, about vicarious suffering, about a man's having his (Jesus') righteousness imputed to him. Perhaps X. Y. Z. can remove our "doubts" upon these things by quoting the language of Jesus to show us differently.

As to a 20th Century Religion, we remark that it is as legitimate to speak of it in that way as to speak of 20th century anything

else. The medical practice of today is of the 20th century and not the 10th, and so of commerce and everything else. There is no man of intelligence but knows that in science and religion we are continually arriving at new view points, and must continue to do so as long as the mind of man continues to grow and only those who keep their faces to the past, and their brains littered with the rubbish of the dark ages can find time to find fault with men and women who are striving for noble living in their own way, and according to 20th century ideals.

Finally, we would like to ask if it is not as pertinent to speak of a 20th Century Religion to distinguish it from that of the 5th or 10th or 15th centuries, as to speak of a Methodist church, or a Baptist church or a United Brethren church in order to distinguish them from each other. Is it possible that X. Y. Z. believes in a Baptist Heaven, or a Methodist heaven, or a United Brethren heaven or is God to be defined as Baptist, Methodist or United Brethren? X. Y. Z. ought to be careful how he uses his knife, he might cut himself. We do not however wish to draw these churches into this little friendly tilt, and only speak of them to show the real point of the logic of X. Y. Z.

We must leave many things unsaid, hoping that X. Y. Z. will come out from the brush so we can see to whom we are indebted for the diatribe in last weeks issue. We are sincerely,
