### First Bronze Medal for Extreme Daring.

Mr. Geo. Poell of Grand Island, who was elected County clerk of Hall county last fall, is the recipient of the first Bronze Medal of Honor, under an act of Congress passed Feb. 1905, for honorable award for heroism. Mr. Poell was fireman on the G. I. & St. Joe railroad the 23rd of last February, when he saw a child in front of his engine in great danger of losing his life. He rushed to the pilot grabbing the child of Paul Usary from the front of the moving train. He succeeded in sweeping the child off the track out of danger, but himself lost his balance and was dragged a distance of 130 feet before the engineer could stop his engine, forty feet was over a bridge. Poell lost one limb but saved the life of the child. The medal was accompanied with a letter of commendation from President Roosevelt.
