An ordinace to provide for the tearing down and removal or destruction of masaic buildings or norts of buildings, or structures, or standing walls of any sort, or signs, or awnings, or torches or frewalls and for the abatement and removed or destruction of the some within the get, of Broken Box and to declare the same a sustance and to provide a penalty for the volation thereof and to provide the tree costs of resoving or desired apon the awners or agents at occupiers thereof. Secrios I.

Section I.

That whenever any building or part of building, or structure or standing walls of any sorts or staft, awning, or perch or frewall within the conjectate limits of the city of Broken Blow should become, by reason of decay or otherwise or from any cause whatever, next are a imprace to the sarety of its ighabitant or to occupiers of adjacent properties or to the citizent generally or properties or any person of persons whatever, that then and in that event the City Connell may, by resolution declars the sample be mulsance and cause said building or part of building or structure, or standing wall, or sign or awning, or porch, or firewall to be removed impediately, without notice to the owner or agent of said described property as the exigencies of the case may require. SECTION II.

Such removal and abatement of such property as described in the foregoing section shall be under the direction of the City Marchall. SECTION III.

The costs attendant upon the removal or abstement of such unsafe or perty as is described in the ordinance shall be a lieu upon the property so removed and real estate upon which the same is situated and shall be collected by sale of such property either state of personal, for that purpose, base as is to be conducted by the City Marshall as a sale upon condition by the city and another same appearance of the same and above the Costs of such removal or abovement, shall be paid over no the owner of such property, and such such sale shall be in the manner provided by law for tales on execution.
