Greenwalt Retains His Office.

On the convening of the new county board Tuesday, Geo. Greenwalt, the old member was allowed to retain his seat as a hold over.

The cause of the contention is the uncertainty of the new law passed last winter. It provided for extending the term of Supervisors and Register of Deeds one year.

Since then Judge Letton has been elected Justice of the Supreme Court to succeed Judge Holcomb, whose time expired the first of the year.

Should the former decision be reversed the election of register of deeds and supervisors will be void and the old officers will hold until 1907.

The terms of G. H. Thorpe, H. B. Schneringer, J. T. Arthur, and B. P. Morris will expire Jan. 1, 1907, by limitation.
