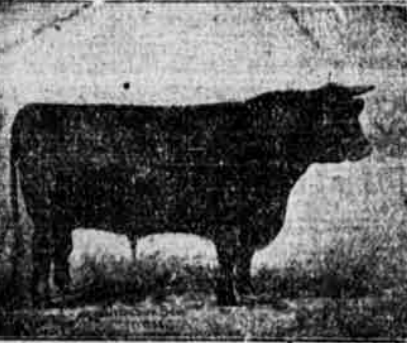

A Large Amount of Business Transacted. Adjourned Until March 13th.

Broken Bow, Jan. 9, 1906.  
 As provided by section 64 of Article 1, Chapter 18 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Nebraska, the Board of Supervisors of Custer County, Nebraska met in regular session at the Court House in Broken Bow, and at 9 o'clock a. m. were called to order by the clerk, who called the roll by districts and the following answered present:

1—J. T. Arthur; 2—Geo. Greenwalt and R. R. Welch; 3—G. H. Thorpe; 4—Joseph Fenimore; 5—H. B. Schneringer; 6—A. Fonda; 7—Ben P. Morris.  
 It was moved and carried, by unanimous vote, that J. T. Arthur be elected temporary chairman.

It was moved and carried that the chair appoint a committee of three on credentials, a committee of three on permanent organization and a committee of three on rules and order of business.

The chair appointed G. H. Thorpe, Ben P. Morris and H. B. Schneringer, as committee on credentials, and stated that he would like a report from this committee before any further business be transacted.

The Committee on Credentials reported as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Custer County, Nebraska: Gentlemen.  
 Your committee on Credentials beg to submit the following report: That we hereby submit the certificates of election of R. R. Welch, for Dist. No. 2; Joseph Fenimore, Dist. No. 4 and A. Fonda, Dist. No. 6, and further report that we find that the bond of R. R. Welch and also bond of George Greenwalt, as holding over, both of Dist. No. 2, both bonds having been approved by the County Judge. In the matter of Dist. No. 2 we recommend that it be governed by stipulations now on file with the County Clerk.

 It is hereby stipulated between Geo. Greenwalt and R. R. Welch, who both claim to be entitled to be seated as a member of the Board of Supervisors representing Dist. No. 2 of said county: 1st that Geo. Greenwalt be seated as a member of the Board pending the decision of the case of Pickle vs Newman in the Supreme Court in the case now pending on commissioner.

2nd. That if the decision of the Court in the case above referred to, sustains the law, by virtue of which Mr. Greenwalt claims to be entitled to hold over, then and in that case Mr. Welch agrees to make no further claim to the office.

3rd. That if the Court declares the law above referred to unconstitutional, then Mr. Greenwalt agrees to vacate said office and allow Mr. Welch to enter upon the duties of the same without delay.

4th. That by the signing of this stipulation Mr. Welch waives none of his rights to said office, or in no way agrees to abandon his claim to said office.

It was moved and carried to adjourn until 1:30 p. m., in order to give the chairman time to arrange his committee.

Committee on claims, George Greenwalt, Ben P. Morris and G. H. Thorpe.

Committee on judiciary claims, H. B. Schneringer, George Greenwalt and A. Fonda.
