There has been only a moderate supply of stockers and feeders during the past week and prices have ruled steady to a little stronger for anything desirable. Good to choice heavy cattle are quotable at \$4.40 to \$4.65; fair to good \$4.00 to \$4.40; good to choice light medium weight steers \$4.00 to \$4.40; fair to good \$3.75 to \$4.00.

The hog market has been strong and active throughout and prices gradually working higher. The run today is moderate at all points and values about a nickel higher than the close of last week, bulk selling at \$6.27 1/2 to \$6.32 1/2, top \$6.35.
