### Morris Directs the Campaign.

We note from the Omaha Bee that S. P. Morris, formerly of this city, is in charge of the collection work for the San Francisco co suffers, in that city. The Bee says:

"The collection work was in the hands of Superintendent Morris of the Associated Charities and he proved himself a master of such undertakings. From noon until after 5 o'clock he had not less than 240 men and boys working under his direction on a carefully systematized plan. By reason of thorough organization the task was made comparatively simple. At least three carloads of material were taken to headquarters at the city hall and so expeditious was the work that one car was loaded at Eighth and Jackson streets in time for the special train, started out by the Union Pacific. All of the labor was voluntary and no one received a penny for his toil.

"Superintendent Morris' plan included the sending out of every wagon over a plainly designated typewritten route. Each wagon was equipped with a crew of two men and one boy, besides the driver. The boy kept working ahead, notifying the householders along both sides of the street to get their contributions ready and the two men followed, one on each side of the street to carry the donations to the wagons. The scheme was intended to save time and it did and worked with splendid success."

### Death of Rev. H. C. Clinton.

Rev. H. C. Clinton passed from labor to reward Wednesday, April 18, 1906, at 7 p. m. at the home of J. O. Wilson, in Cliff, Custer county, Nebraska. He had been sick six weeks prior to his death and the last two weeks had been at the home of Mr. Wilson. With no pain he peacefully crossed the river Jordan and entered into the rest the Lord had prepared. The deceased was 89 years old.

Rev. H. C. Clinton was a pioneer missionary and organizer of the General Baptist churches in Nebraska. He was sent from the General Baptist Conference of Tennessee some eighteen years ago. He has made Custer coun-

ty most of the time and is widely known. His work was in Custer, Logan, Lincoln, Boyd and Brock counties, as well as other counties of the state in which he preached the Gospel of Christ.

The remains of the deceased were laid to rest in the Cliff Cemetery, after appropriate services at the M. E. church, conducted by Rev. D. L. Wood, Grady, Nebraska.

Although the deceased had not a blood relative present or living, all care was given him that Christian hands could minister and the services of five medical men. He will be missed as no other man, as he spent his life in serving others. W. J. Rick.
