### South Omaha Stock Market.

(Reported by Clay, Robinson & Co.)

South Omaha, Nebraska, April 23rd, 1906.

Although the run of cattle continued moderate last week, conditions were far from satisfactory. Packers in Chicago seem to be pretty well filled up, claiming a bad inquiry for beef, and conditions all combined made a very slow and dragging market for almost the entire of last week. Closing prices as compared with the opening were 15 and 20c lower for the general run of steers, the light handy weight kinds hardly receiving the discrimination of other classes. At this time the best kinds coming are selling around \$4.90 and \$5.25; fair to good \$4.50 and \$4.90. The general trade today is slow and weak with values barely steady. Butcher stock fared in about the same manner as steer stuff. The trade dragged through most of the week and concessions of 15 and 20 cents had to be made at the close as compared with early in the week. Choice heifer stock is quotable at \$4.25 and \$4.60; choice cows \$4.00 and \$4.40; good cows \$3.40 and \$3.60; fair kinds around \$3.00. Trade today continues slow and weak.

While there was fairly good inquiry from countrymen for the light and handy steers for stocker purposes the heavy weights suitable to go into feed lots suffered a decline of 10 and 15 cents.

from Monday prices. Calves held up pretty well as the run is comparatively light at this time. Good to choice stockers and feeders are selling at \$4.15 and \$4.50; fair to good \$3.90 and \$4.15; common classes, \$3.50 and \$3.75.

The hog market continues on a downward course, the condition having prevailed since the middle of last week, prices last week closing about a nickel lower for the week. With a 5 or 10 cents today occasioned no doubt by the fairly liberal supplies, prices are now about 15c lower than one week ago. The bulk sold at \$6.32 1/2 and \$6.35 with top at \$6.40. We are of the opinion that where hogs are in good condition and ready for market it is just as well to let them come along, as we can hardly expect to see much further advance at this time.

Mr. Bruner, of Arcadia, did the work and it is needless to say a first class job will be done for we had him make us a well last year and all one has to do is to tell him where you want the well sunk and Mr. B. will do the rest, and not stop till plenty of water is secured and a first class well is the result for he certainly understands his business.
