200,000 Unclaimed Letters.

Doubtless there are many readers of the REPUBLICAN who have written relatives or friends in San Francisco, but received no reply and are wondering if they are numbered with the dead, which may not be the case as the disaster was the cause of changing the street number of over 200,000 people.

A report from San Francisco says: "Local postoffice officials report that 24,000 letters were placed on the advertised list during the past week. Within the past four weeks there were returned from the carriers to the general delivery section about 200,000 letters, the greater portion of which had return requests on the envelopes and were sent back to the writers. The remainder, after having been advertised for thirty days, will be sent to the dead letter office in Washington.

Bulletin of Western Nebraska.

The Quarterly Bulletin No. 8 for April, 1906, issued by Deputy Commissioner Bush and Chief Clerk Despain, of the State Bureau of Statistics has been received recently by this office.

It is a volume of 28 pages and deals exclusively with "Western Nebraska."

It takes up each county of the 34, that it has under consideration, as well as each township of each county and gives an exhaustive report as is possible from any source. The prospective investor or homeseeker could hardly find a better guide.

The first ten pages are devoted to a general description of western Nebraska, as an area giving data relative to its growth, agricultural productions, educational facilities, giving the school funds, districts, teachers of each county. After this is a general summary giving the financial condition of each county, the average amount of rain fall, including precipitation 1905, amount of government land in each district and in each county, quality of soil, prices of classified lands and increase in the past five years, crops and stock, productions and shipments.
