WILL DRIVE AN OSTRICH.

Jac'sonville, an Ostrich With a 2:12 Record will Show His Speed at the Custer County Fair.

W. W. Ford, who represents an ostrich farm at Jacksonville, Fla., and who has seventeen ostriches at Dreemland, will give a driving exhibition at that resort today. Two ostriches have been broken, one for driving and the other for riding. Jacksonville, the ostrich Mr. Ford will drive, has a record of 2:12, made last year on the Old Point Breeze track, at Philadelphia. The ostrich raced against a horse with a record of 2:07.

The ostrich is driven to a Martin Payne four-wheel speed wagon with pneumatic tires. The harness used consists of a halter without bit, the reins snapping into a ring on each side of the beak, breast collar, saddle, surcingle, girth and crupper and traces.-New York Herald, July, 1905.
