Electric Lights.
A recent report of the Seward Electric light works says, although it has been but two years since the electric light plant has been under municipal control, it has proven a valuable investment for the city. * * * The Blade says that the plant is more than paying its way. The number of customers has increased since March 1, 1905, from 206 to 312.

The total expense of operating the plant for the year, including \$3,482.19 for material was \$7,576.02. The receipts for the year was \$10,650.19. This gave a surplus of \$3,074.17. In addition to this the material in stock invoiced \$594.54 more than at the beginning a year previous. In figuring everything the report shows a net profit of \$3,114.06.
