

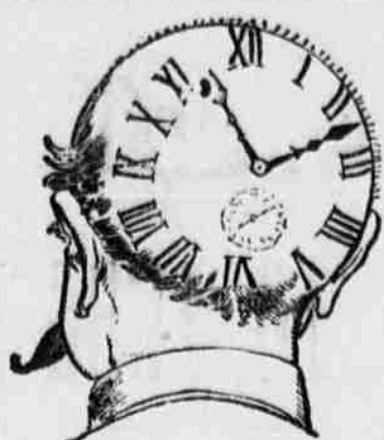

Broken Bow, Nebraska,
August 9, 1906.

As per adjournment of July 25, the county board of Equalization of Custer county, Nebraska, met at the court house at 9 a. m. and were called to order by the chairman. All members present.

The entire forenoon was spent in committee work.

At 12 o'clock the board adjourned till 2 p. m.
