Shady Methods of Companies Campaign.

(From the Worchester (Mass.) Post.) The present management of the Mutual and New York Life Insurance Companies have already been convicted before the bar of public opinion of some very shady methods used in endeavoring to prevent the policy holders from securing their

rights in the coming election, In the United States the managements' campaigns have been conducted on the principle of using any means and petty device to hamper the policy holders representatives in their efforts to secure an honest ballot for the persons interested. In European counties, however, the Mutual and New York Life directors and trustees have apparently not been content with pettifogging tactics but have resorted to actual slander and falsehood to promote their campaign.

The managements have succeeded in inducing many foreign newspapers which are now coming to hand in this country to print libellous attacks upon the candidates of the Policy Holders' Association, referring to men who stand highest in that body as "persons of shady records." The whole tone of the articles in question, aside from such direct charges, is intended to give the impression that the policy holders' candidates are dishonest

grafters. The absurdity of making such allegations against men like Richard Olney, Judge Gray, Judge Parker, Samuel Untermeyer and John Wanamaker may not be so thoroughly understood abroad as it is in this country. At least, the insurance "mis-sionaries" evidently hope that such is the case.

But the very fact that the men now in control of the "big three" companies are ready to use such tactics where they think there is a chance of their being effective, is reason enough for retiring the present officials, even if there were not innumerable other reasons for turning them out of office, bag and baggage.
