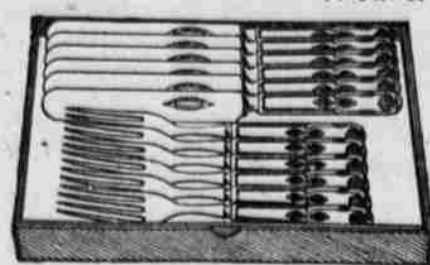
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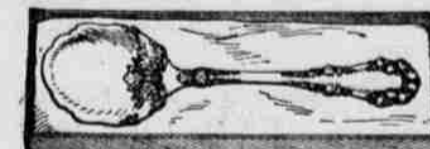

Geo. Apple Took Poison by Mistake

But for Prompt Action He Would Now be Across the Great Divide Instead of Enjoying Himself at the Nebraska State Fair at Lincoln.

Ex-Mayor George W. Apple's stomach had been out of kilter for several days and to get matters straightened in that locality was taking medicine put up in tablet form.

Some time ago Mrs. Apple had a sore hand and the medicine she used was also put up in tablets which were dissolved in water and applied externally, the chief ingredient being corrosive sublimate, one-fourth of a grain of which is sufficient to cause death.

Last Sunday night, while Mrs. Apple was at church Mr. Apple opened the box he supposed contained the tablets for his use and swallowed the prescribed number. He noticed they did not taste as before so he turned on the light and upon examining the box discovered that he had made a very serious mistake, having taken the tablets prescribed for Mrs. Apple.

About this time Mrs. Apple returned home and Dr. Bartholomew was summoned and his prompt action in using a stomach pump saved Mr. Apple's life as he had taken 2 1/2 grains of the poison—eight times more than enough to cause death.

Mr. Apple was able to attend to business on Monday, although feeling rather weak on account of the experience, and as he had arranged to go to Lincoln Tuesday did not allow the occurrence to interfere with his plans.

It makes no difference as to how much of a hurry you are in to take medicine, and even though you are positive there is no poison in the house, the only safe way to do is to delay long enough to know, by an examination of the label, that you have the right bottle—or box as the case may be.

Schneringer were elected delegates to the state convention. R. Miller, E. P. Savage and John E. Meyers were elected delegates to the 10th judicial district convention.
