

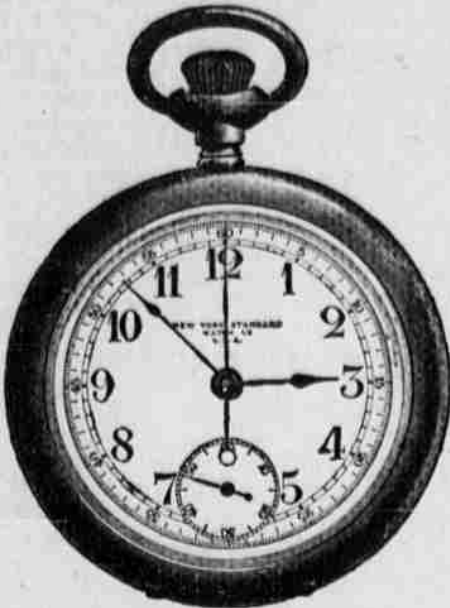

Twenty-three Years Ago.

(From the REPUBLICAN files.)

"Broken Bow has a shoemaker at last."

"Laud hunters are becoming numbers and it is common for parties to ride all night to get in ahead of someone else on filing."

"Teams are being engaged to haul up the first invoice of lumber for the new lumber yard. Some twenty-five teams will make the first trip and more if they can be engaged."

The West Union correspondent said: "Our town is plotted and will be surveyed soon. Liberal offers are made to anyone who will put up buildings for any kind of business."

"Is it not about time for the officers and patrons of this school district to take some action toward securing a term of school to be taught this fall and winter? The school season is now at hand and there is no house in the district to hold school in nor has any successful steps been taken to secure one."

"The first brick kiln burned in Custer county, was burned at this place and opened out Monday; the brick are hard, with a strong metallic sound on being struck, and of a fine cherry red in color, proving that the clay is first-class in every particular; the success of this industry removes one of the great contending drawbacks and will enable builders to put up spacious buildings at reasonable figures. Work will go on and another kiln will be burned

soon, as the 120,000 in the first kiln has been contracted for, and one-half as many more could be sold if ready.

"A. W. Gandy and family moved into his new dwelling, the fore part of this week. His residence is the largest in this part of the valley, being two stories high." This is the residence southwest of the north side school building and is now owned and occupied by C. W. Luce.
