Twenty-nine of the largest cities of the world are doomed. Earthquake, flood and fire will wreak the vengeance of God on the cities and their inhabitants within the next twenty-four months. This wholesale destruction is to be God's judgment on four nations.

South Omaha Market.

Under date of Nov. 19th, Clay, Robinson & Co. reported as follows:

The trade in corn-fed cattle continues of very modest proportions. The principal supply of this class is only partly-fatted and warmed and grades. There are still a good many good fleshy westerners coming, and this causes rather slack trade on corn cattle other than the good, well finished kinds. Good fatted stock would meet with ready sale at prices around \$6.00 to \$6.25, with fair classes at \$5.25 up to \$6.00. The very best kinds of short-feds are selling around \$5.00 and down as low as \$3.95, owing to flesh and quality. The cow market was a little slow all last week, and while the better stock held not far from steady, medium and common classes suffered a reaction of 10 to 15 cents.

There is a growing inquiry for the light and medium weight stock steers and these have sold better the past week than for some time. Good yearlings sold around \$4.15 last week, which is about as high as any number in these ages have gone. Good kinds of feeding steers are selling at \$3.75 to \$4.25, fair classes below \$3.75.

The hog market has struck a very weak spot, and the general trend of values is lower. The market suffered a further reaction of a nickel today, the bulk selling at \$5.95 to \$6.05, top at \$6.15.

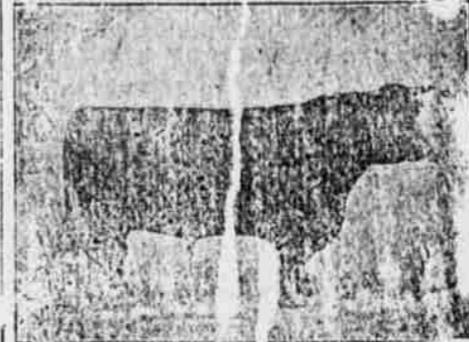
