Pay P. O. Box Rent Promptly.

A new ruling has just been
made by the postoffice depart-
ment requiring box rents to be
collected in the ten days preced-
ing the beginning of each quar-
ter, instead of in the first fifteen
days of the quarter, as heretofore.
The postmaster is required to
vacate such boxes as are not
paid for on the first day of the
new quarter. Those Broken
Bow renters of postoffice boxes
who have been in the habit of
paying most any old time during
the quarter for which box rent is
due will now have to step up and
square up on or before the 1st
day of each quarter or in goes
the "vacant" sign and the box is
locked—on the inside. These
are your Uncle Sam's orders to
his post office slaves and they
know better than to disobey
Uncle S.

Killed a Wolf.

The Ansley Chronicle-Citizen
says an ugly wolf that has been
causing considerable trouble to
farmers and stock raisers living
northeast of Ansley, was captur-
ed and killed by John Carothers' hounds the first of last week. It
is the largest of the wolf specie
that has been caught in this
part of the county in many years,
measuring 5 feet and 3 inches
from tip to tip, the head measur-
ing 12 inches. It has been seen
by farmers numerous times and
was known by the dark hair on
its back. One of the hounds
was horribly mutilated by the
wolf in the fight.

South Omaha Market.

Under date of December 3rd,
Clay, Robinson & Co. issued the
following:

The offering of fed-steers is
still very light. Very few cattle
seem to be finished for market,
and the principal offering of this
class is short-fed and only
warmed up steers. Choice well
finished cattle would sell at \$6.25
and up; fair to good kinds are
going around \$5.50 to \$6.00;
short-feds \$5.00 and below.
There is practically nothing be-
ing offering in dry-lot butcher
stock, although grass cows are
coming in very fair proportions
with prices holding steady to
strong.

Little change has been notice-
able in the desirable classes of
stockers and feeders. There has
been ample demand for all of-
ferings in this division to hold
prices steady to strong. There
is little call, however, for the
common light stock and these
meet rather unsatisfactory sale.
Prices for the general run are
practically the same as last week.

The hog market today showed
a little strength, enough so that
salesmen were able to get a
shade higher prices than pre-
vailed here Saturday. The bulk
sold at \$6.05 and \$6.10 with top
at \$6.20.
