### Subscribers Must Pay.

The REPUBLICAN is frequently asked if a person is liable for payment of a newspaper if he has ordered it stopped, or if he never subscribed for it. These questions have been decided by the Supreme courts of the states of Iowa, New Hampshire, Delaware and Wisconsin, and the decision in each is practically the same. If a person continues to accept a paper sent him through the mail he is liable for the subscription price, regardless of the fact that he never subscribed for it. If a subscriber in arrears orders a paper discontinued and does not pay the arrearages, he is liable for it so long as it is sent to his address, until he pays the whole amount due.
