



Of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Custer, State of Nebraska.

Broken Bow, Nebraska, Jan. 21st, 1906.

Persuant to adjournment of January 14, 1907, the County board of Supervisors met at the court house and were called to order by the chairman.

All members present. Minutes of January 14, 1907, were read and approved.

The forenoon was spent in committee work and at 12 o'clock recess was taken till 1:30 p. m.
