How astonished the Japs would be if they could see some of the accounts now appearing in our yellow-newspapers of how they are preparing for war on America.

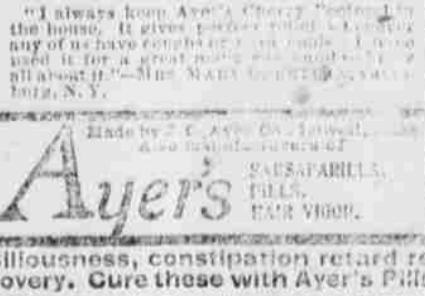
An Indian woman has just been married for the eighth time. She ought to have, by this time, passed the period of "trial marriages."

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING

Hon. F. M. Currie's Horses and Buggy Swept Down a Creek and He Barely Escapes.

The thawing of snow last week caused all creek banks to become filled with swiftly flowing water and the usual places for fording became unsafe. Last Saturday, Hon. F. M. Currie, accompanied by J. Ulrich, of Bradshaw, left the Currie ranch for this city. A drive of four miles brought them to a fording place on Deer creek which was terribly swollen, but they finally decided to attempt crossing.

The swift current floated and over-turned the buggy and the horses were unable to swim while hitched to it, consequently the whole rig was swept down stream. It was with difficulty the occupants managed to get ashore, and they wonder now how they succeeded in doing so. The bodies of the horses and a part of the buggy were found the next day three miles from where the accident occurred.

Arrested for Grand Larceny.

On February 3rd, A. G. Spencer, residing near Weissert, lost a purse containing \$90.

On Monday of this week Link Trotter was arrested and brought to Broken Bow by Deputy sheriff Ernie Thompson. It is charged that Trotter found the money and, notwithstanding the fact he knew to whom it belonged, converted it to his own use.

Trotter was arraigned in the county court, Judge Humphrey presiding, Tuesday, when he plead not guilty. In order to get witnesses a continuance was taken until 10 o'clock tomorrow, bond for the appearance of defendant being placed at \$250.

County Attorney Gutterson prosecutes and N. T. Gadd appears for the defendant.

Made for Americans.

Hon. Ricard Bartholdt, in an address to Republicans in St. Louis, pointed out the great reason why the Republican party will cling to the Protective Tariff. "While in Europe last summer," says Mr. Bartholdt, "I found that the people were unanimously opposed to the American policy of Protection. It is a bad thing for the Europeans, but a splendid thing for Americans. The American laborer is to-day receiving wages three times greater than is paid to his German brother, and twice as much as the laborer of England."

That is the reason why the republican party, which created the Tariff, will defend it. Europe does not like the American Tariff. But the American people prosper through it, and will retain it. The fact that the American laborer gets twice as much wages as the British worker in the same field, and three times as much as the German laborer, furnishes a complete vindication of the Republican Protective policy. The Tariff is largely responsible for the American worker's pre-eminence among his fellows all over the world. Over 1,000,000 immigrants come to the United States every year to share in the prosperity which the Republican party's Tariff policy has won for the country.

The Tariff which the Republican party has devised, and which it will maintain, is for the United States only. No effort was made by the framers of the Tariff to please England, France, Germany, or any other old-world country. The interests of the American worker were the sole concern of the Republican party in creating the Tariff. By the American worker is meant the entire body of the population, consumers as well as producers.
