

## Free Public High School Attendance.

For several sessions the Nebraska legislature has tried to formulate an adequate law for free High school privileges throughout the state. Two or more such laws have been passed, but declared not constitutional. The present law was drafted after careful consultation with eminent jurists, and is believed to be within the requirements. This law provides that all pupils of any public school district in the state are to have the privilege of four years free instruction in High school.

The requirements are as fol-

The pupil must have a statement from the county superin- CLEVELAND INSTITUTE of MEDICINE tendent of the proper countystating that said pupil has completed the Eighth grade, and cannot secure further advancement in the district of his or her residence. (The same applies to those who have completed the work of the Ninth, Tenth or Eleventh grade.)

The parents (or guardian) of the pupil desiring this privilege shall make application in writing, to the county superintendent of the proper county stating Saturday and Sunday the number of the school district D, A. COLYER in which they live, the number of pupils for whom this privilege and the grade which each of the pupils is to enter. This applica-tion must be made to the county superintendent not later than the second Monday in June.

It then becomes the duty of the county superintendent to notify the district in which said pupils reside, which district shall levy a tax for this purpose, sufficient to pay the tuition of said pupils at the school of their choice, at the rate of seventyfive cents per week. If the district shall fail to vote such tax, it becomes the duty of the district board to order such levy; and in case both the district and district board shall tail, it becomes the duty of the county superintendent to make and deliver to the county clerk an itemized statement of the amount necessary to be levied. The clerk shall include these amounts in the levy for school purposes.

The principal thing for all to remember who desire to take advantage of the provisions of this act may be re-stated, as follows: Satisfactory evidence must be furnished that the pupil has completed the work of at least the Eightn grade, and that the higher grades are not taught in the district of residence.

Since the law provides that seventy-five cents per week, it is probable that High schools will generally make this the rate of resident pupils.
