

Nebraska State Fair.
The State Fair to be held at Lincoln, September 2-6, gives promise of being the greatest State Fair ever held in Nebraska. Secretary W. R. Mellor informs us that the exhibits in all departments are very heavy, and promise to exceed in magnitude those of last year, which was the record breaker heretofore. The management have secured Chas. J. Strobel and his airship, which are now making flights at the Jamestown Exposition, to make daily flights at the Fair. The stake races have 128 horses named in them, as against 58 named last year, and this feature of the Fair is looked forward to with great anticipation by the horse lovers. Fully 25 per cent more swine will be exhibited this year than last, and all the live stock departments are receiving an abundance of entries.

Teachers Wanted.
There is a shortage of teachers in almost every part of Nebraska. Custer County will be in need of fifty more teachers than it now has. This condition is largely the result of the new law which requires everyone who has not taught to receive Normal training.

After September 1, 1907, no teacher's certificate will be issued to beginning teachers who have not had normal training. This means better schools and larger salaries. Custer College makes a specialty of fitting teachers for first, second and third grade certificates. There has, also, been a law passed prohibiting all who have not a 10th grade education, or its equivalent, from entering the State Normal Schools of Nebraska.
