## THE PRESS, PULPIT AND PUBLIC

What is Going on Here and There That is of Interest to the Readers Throughout Nebraska.

Brakeman Butler, who was injured at Rushville, died a few days later.

The dates for the Fillmore county fair are September 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

Oxford's water bonds have been disposed of and the system is now assured.

Heavy rains of late have wrought havoc with bridges in Cass and Saunders counties.

J. W. Matthews, foreman of the Windsor stables in Lincoln, was killed by a street car last week.

While Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Boone were at church services in Auburn their horse and buggy were stolen.

The sixth annual old settlers picnic of Colfax county will be held at the court house grounds August 31.

Mrs. Fred Rogge of Palmer, Kas., who is visiting in Auburn, was seriously if not fatally injured in a runaway.

The state banking board has granted a certificate to the Citizens' State bank of Wood Lake. The new bank has a capital stock of \$10,000.

The farm residence of Ben Mappes, ten miles east of Grand Island, was totally destroyed by fire, together with a large portion of the contents.

The management of the Fillmore county agricultural society is preparing for large crowds at the coming county fair to be held September 10 to 13.

Governor Hughes of New York is expected in Hastings to attend the Nebraska Baptist State convention, which will be held from October 5 to 10, inclusive.

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Roy Brown, a young farmer of the vicinity of Oxford, offers a reward of \$50 for the apprehension of the person who stole a valuable horse and buggy belonging to him.

The mayor of Omaha thinks the salary of the governor ought to be \$10,000 a year, and if he makes the race it will be with expectations that the salary will be thus regulated.

Seventeen persons have perished in the waters of northern Nebraska and Gregory county, South Dakota, during the present season—the largest number ever known for one summer.

The clock purchased by the Schuyler high school class of 1907 from the proceeds of the class play arrived and will be placed in the hall of the high school as a remembrance of that class.

The officers of the Nebraska City chautauqua association claim that there will be a surplus of something like \$500 left after paying all of the expenses of the recent ten days meeting.

At Du Bois, in Pawnee county, Sol Alabaugh was stabbed to death by Frank Boren. Both were young men and well known in the county. The murder was the outcome of an old grudge.

Miss Frances Jerman, daughter of Joseph Jerman of West Point, has been selected by the board of governors of the Ak-Sar-Ben to be one of the maids of honor at the coronation of Queen Quivera.

The annex to the English Lutheran church at Grand Island, recently completed at a cost of \$3,700, was dedicated Sunday by the pastor, Rev. W. T. Kahse, and Rev. Dr. L. P. Ludden of Lincoln.

While threshing on the farm of Carl Moline, in Saunders county, Ernest Johnson was caught by the band cutter on the self feeder and a gash six inches long was cut in the fleshy part of his right arm.

For the accommodation of the members of the Grand Army of the Republic the Burlington has arranged to run, through tourist cars from Lincoln to Omaha direct to Saratoga, using the Wabash east of Chicago.

The Wayne Normal closed its year's work with an Alumni day program, which was listened to by about 250 members of the Alumni association. The total registration this year was more than 1,700, while the attendance for the summer term just closed was 747. Commencement exercises began, August 2, with 83 graduates from the teachers' and scientific departments.

James Robley, the man who is charged with outraging the 12-year-old daughter of Mrs. Z. Gardner, had a preliminary hearing at West Point and was committed for trial in district court, under bonds of \$1,000, which he has been unable to furnish. The county jail of Cumming county now contains three inmates, all of whom are charged with offenses of this nature.

The total assessed valuation of Sarpy county for this year is \$3,435,827.76. The state levy will be 7 mills and the county levy about 14 mills.

J. B. Lull, one of the oldest men in that section of the state and one of the oldest Odd Fellows in Nebraska, being 93 years of age, is lying dangerously ill at his home in Nebraska City, and no hopes are entertained for his recovery. This is the first serious illness he has ever experienced and prior to this sick spell he was one of the best preserved men in the state.

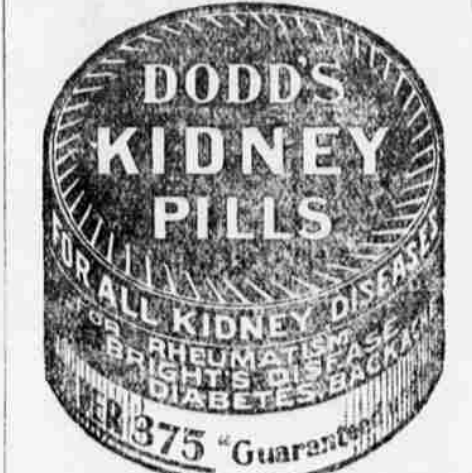
