New Ruling for Final Proof.

In view of the fact that many of the United States land offices are so crowded with applications to make final proof that it is impossible to fix dates for several months—thus causing great hardships in some instances to settlers who have complied with the law and desire to make commutation proofs and leave their land during the winter months, the commissioner of the general land office has made a ruling calculated to relieve a large number of claimants.

Where applications to make final proof are accompanied by affidavits setting forth briefly the facts as to the period of actual residence, the amount of cultivation and improvements, and why absence is desired, the absence of claimants from and after the filing of application until the day fixed by the local officers for submission of proof, will not prevent applicants from making such proof on the day set.

Trouble for Postmaster Jewett

At one minute past 12 o'clock last Monday night railway mail clerks and postmasters throughout the United States began the weighing of mails and counting each and every piece of mail deposited for transmission and will continue to weigh and count for thirty days in obedience to a general order by the postmaster general authorized by an act of congress.

In the regular appropriation bill for the postal service, approved March 1, the clause requiring the weighing for thirty days was inserted. It is the first time in the history of the post-office department that the weighing of all mail matter in all trains over all routes on which mail clerks are employed has been required.

For this special thirty days' weighing test Congress made an appropriation of \$300,000.
