### Broken Bow Extends Welcome to Farmers of Custer County

Citizens and Business Men of Broken Bow Meet and Decide to Entertain as Guests in their Homes All Who Attend the Farmers Institute  
EVERY CUSTER COUNTY FARMER INVITED  
The Program as Now Arranged a Good One, But Additional Entertaining Features Will be Added. Thereby Making It "The Best Ever."

In response to a call to meet at the court house at 7:30 o'clock on Monday evening, over one hundred business men and citizens responded.

The meeting was called to order by Judge Humphrey who requested that a chairman and secretary be selected, whereupon Jules Haumont was chosen to preside and E. R. Purcell as secretary. The latter stated that a Farmers' Institute was to be held in Broken Bow on Thursday and Friday, December 19 and 20.

Heretofore the Institutes have been held and the expenses borne by the farmers who attended and this meeting was called for the purpose of ascertaining the sentiment of citizens in regard to entertaining, free all who came to attend the Institute. The necessities was further exemplified by Hon. J. D. Ream, the Institute president, and a general discussion and consideration of the question indulged in, remarks being made by Postmaster Jewett, County Clerk Pigman, Judge Humphrey, Attorneys Ross Moore, H. M. Sullivan and James Ledwith, Supt. of Schools Pinckney, Register of Deeds Wood, Jesse Gandy and Ed. Bishop of Gates.

In order to get a sentiment from those present all were requested to rise to their feet who would open their homes for those who come to attend the Institute and everyone present was instantly on his feet, demonstrating that all who come may be certain they will be taken care of in a hospitable manner and free of expense.

Let every Custer county farmer and his wife come to Broken Bow during the Institute if they possibly can—every home in the city will be open to them on this occasion and they will be heart-

ily welcome, "yea, thrice welcome."

The program will be interspersed with singing and orchestra music.

On Saturday December 21, the corn contest between boys and girls in the Custer county schools will be held under the supervision of County Supt. Pinckney who estimates there will be present, at least, one hundred and fifty out of the three hundred boys and girls who entered the contest. A committee was appointed to arrange a program to entertain the boys and girls while guests of Broken Bow citizens, so they may rest assured that everything possible will be done to make the day a pleasant one for them and free of all expense.

#### Obituary.

Mary Ellen Jones was born on August 15, 1837, in Wells county, Indiana, where she lived for many years. She was converted to christianity and united with the United Brethern church when she was 18 years of age. Later she united with the Baptist church of which she was a faithful member for years. After moving to Nebraska she united with the Dunkard church, it being the only church near her home.

She was united in marriage to James Dagan, August 15, 1858. To this union was born three children. James Dagan died in 1864, leaving her to care for three small children in those dark days of the civil war. On August 25, 1866, she was married to Andrew J. Freeli; to this union was born six children. She died November 13, 1907, leaving an aged husband, four sons, a daughter, a number of grand-children and a host of friends to mourn the loss of a faithful, loving wife, a devoted mother and a true friend. The children are Joseph Dagan, Orla Freeli, Jessie Freeli, Isaiah Freeli and Mrs. Phebe Phillipsen, all of Broken Bow. She was a patient sufferer for many months before her death, during all of which time she was faithfully trusting God whom she had served from her girlhood.

Funeral services were held on Friday, November 15, at the home, ten miles south of Broken Bow, conducted by Rev. Brady of the Baptist church, after which the remains were followed by a large concourse of friends and relatives to the Broken Bow cemetery where interment was made. The family express their heartfelt thanks to their many friends who have so kindly and sympathetically aided them in this time of trial and sorrow.
