New Lines Drawn for County Division

A Small Bunch of Agitators Assembled in Merna Last Saturday and Drew New Division Lines

ONLY SEVEN TOWNSHIPS RESPOND

Enthusiasm Which Leaders Supposed Would Be Aroused Failed to Put in Its Appearance

A call having been issued for a meeting to be held at Merna last Saturday for the purpose of drawing and agreeing upon new lines for dividing the county...

When it was discovered that only this little bunch were present to undo a great county like Custer, it was evident the real estate dealers and town lot owners in prospective county seat towns...

Just think of the nerve displayed. Twenty-two fellows fix up a dose which they would cram down the throats of five thousand voters.

After it was found who were present and wherefrom, as stated above, a committee on credentials was appointed to draw new lines upon which to divide the county, part of the committee being Richard E. Brega, H. H. Hyatt, John Davis and Marshall Eddy.

During the twenty minutes the committee were out exercising their brains(?) in an effort to make good for the town lot owners in Sargent, Ansley and Callaway—especially for R. E. Brega—the other representatives congregated in twos and threes and discussed as to what kind of a wild animal the county would look like with the new lines drawn through it...

It is as rank gerrymandering in an effort to get votes as was ever perpetrated. The lines drawn at the Merna meeting for the proposed new counties are somewhat similar to those shown by a map published in the REPUBLICAN, except that by making several hooks and crooks Broken Bow is taken into the northwest quarter and the southeast quarter is named Monroe.

Coal Docks to be Built Here. It is given out authoritatively that the B. & M. Railroad company have decided to remove the coal sheds at both Ansley on the east and Anselmo on the west, and combine them in Broken Bow, work on the project to begin in the early spring.

While this may see a matter of but little importance—at first blush—it is an addition to the city of considerable magnitude as a number of men will be employed day and night, thereby increasing the company pay roll several "checks" each month.

The machinery of the gas plant is today being moved to its location in the basement of the new building and tonight gas for your lights will be furnished from the new location.

Flour Shipments from Broken Bow.

Many of our citizens do not realize the importance of the Broken Bow Milling company to the city and it is probable but that very few residents are aware—perhaps never thought—that several carloads of flour are shipped out by the mill every week.

And these shipments are not made to nearby or small cities in the state, but clear across the United States where flour manufactured by this mill is used in preference to the far-famed products of the Minneapolis mills.

As an instance of what the mill is doing in the way of shipping abroad, and which is a weekly occurrence, one car of flour has been shipped to Chicago and two cars to San Francisco his week in addition to shipments to several towns in the state, in which mills are located, where Broken Bow flour sells more rapidly than their home product, although at a higher price.

The Broken Bow mill is an institution that is valuable to the city and the country adjoining and should be fostered and aided in every way possible. The more flour manufactured the more flour put in circulation here for additional help and for wheat.
