Dr. Carrol, more fortunate, recovered from the disease following experimental inoculation, but he never knew a well day after he plunged his hand into the fatal jar. Maj. Reed's widow has a pension of \$125 a month from the United States; Dr. Lazear's receives \$17. There is no person, declares Collier's, who is not touched near to the depths of his capacity for admiration by the thought of these men. Their monuments should be set up for inspiration in every school throughout the land where youths are taught to become physicians.

Farthest North Race.

It looks like another "farthest porth" race. Dr. Frederick A. Cook of Brooklyn, who is an arctic explorer of some note, having been surgeon of one of Commander Peary's expeditions and of a Belgian exploring party ten years ago, is now well up to the pole. His party, when last heard of, was encamped at a point 650 miles south of the pole, and considerably farther north than was reached by the late Peary expedition, although Peary himself penetrated to within about 200 miles of the object of the search. It is Dr. Cook's intention to dash to the north pole when the conditions are favorable, and his wife, who has just returned from the polar region, is confident he will succeed. This appears like trying to steal a march on Peary, who was making elaborate preparations for another trip northward, but was compelled to abandon the project for the present because his ship could not be put in readinces.

Reports come from London every few months that St. Paul's cathedral is settling and that its walls are cracking. A committee of architects appointed to inquire into the condition of the building when the county councli planned to run a sewer within 45 feet of the southwest tower has reported and, although repairs are needed at once, the structure is in no immediate danger of collapse. It needs to be carefully watched, however. The foundations do not rest on bed-rock, and as the water has been drained from the subsoil, the earth has settled, and allowed the walls to settle also. One engineer has suggested that holes be bored in the ground about the building and that they be kept filled with water, so that the earth may be restored to its natural condition at the time when the whole district roundabout was not sealed up with pavements or covered with buildings, and the rain could percolate through the soil.

A remarkably interesting engineering operation has lately been in progrees in Brooklyn, N. Y. A large brick theater building, having walls 99 feet high, has been lifted from its foundations, turned squarely round and moved 300 feet to a new site. To turn it the exact center of the floor was ascertained, and with this as a hub a series of small steel rollers were laid on a prepared platform, and then the building, resting on steel beams, was allowed to settle down on the rollers. With jack-screws on two diagonally opposite corners pushing in opposite directions, the structure was then turned as of on a pivot. The moving of brick buildings is common, but this is said to be the largest and heaviest structure that has ever been put bodily on new foundations.

To Press a Coat.

All pressing should be done on the wrong side, except the last or finished pressing. Turn the collar up, dampen and stretch. Hold up one end and press it in the form of a loop, so as te keep the round effect. Dampen the revers on the padded side along the fold and press until dry. In pressing the sleeves, the shoulders should be placed over a pad. Then the entire coat should be pressed on the right side, using a wet cloth and a hot iron to give a finish.

Mother's Vegetable Soup.

Pare, slice the potatoes and turn into the soup kettle with plenty of cold water, add a half opton sticed and let boil thirty minutes or until the vegetables are tender a little chopped celery may be used it you have it. Season with salt and pepper, add some good, rich milk or cream and a piece of butter the size of a walnut and a few spoonfuls of cannec or cold cooked tomatoes. Serve as it comes to a boil.

To Clean Delicate Fabrics. Soiled places or spots can be removed from laces, silks and delicate fabrics by making a paste of talcum powder and aqua ammonia. Put in the powder in a cup, three or four teaspoonfuls, and mix to a thin paste with the ammonia. Lay the goods out a cloth; cover the soiled place with the paste; rub with a soft cloth and let stand till dry. Then brush or shake off the powder.
