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The Horse's Sweet Tooth.

The following from the American Farmer while known by some will be new to many, and if any of the REPUBLICAN readers experiment along the lines prescribed, we would be glad to learn of the result.

"If you want your horses to be sleek, fat and strong feed them on molasses, not the fine syrups, but the old-fashioned New Orleans black article. Most people will be astonished at this, thinking that the horse loves nothing but grains and grasses. This is a mistake. No animal has a sweeter tooth than the horse. Experienced horsemen have long been onto the secret, but the common run of animal owners never heard of it and will scarcely believe it. Look at those magnificent Percherons drawing great loads on our streets. See those giant Normandies, weighing 2000 pounds each. Feast your eyes on those sturdy Clydesdales, those dapple-grays, able to pull a few tons without flinching. All fed on molasses. In administering this saccharine condiment, the blackest you can buy, first chop your hay into bits and to each peck add one pint of molasses. Mix thoroughly and the horse will do the rest. Use about the same quantity of syrup with oats, shorts, corn or other grain. If you find that one horse may have a sweeter tooth than another, regulate the treacle accordingly. It is best to mix that nothing will be left in the trough. It is not an expensive food as good New Orleans or Porto Rico molasses can be bought for 13 1/2 c a gallon or by the hoghead or barrel for a little less. Try this appetizing treatment on your poor, old broken-down nag and you will be surprised at the results. It will not only add to his strength and appearance, but to his life, and instead of being a candidate for the boneyard at the age of eleven, he will be pulling you around the country or the towns at twenty-seven.

"The truth of all this has been abundantly proved by veteran horsemen, who worked wonders on their stock by sweetening the food.

"The old notion that horses by nature are confined to vegetable foods and can subsist on no other will have to be given up. Most horses never have anything to eat except the grains and grasses. Generally they do well on these and few have ever suspected that they would be benefited by a radical departure to food apparently entirely foreign to their habits.

"That he liked sweets has long been known, as nothing is commoner than for a rider or a driver to give his horse a few lumps of sugar at the end of a journey. This taste, however, was regarded as abnormal and only to be encouraged sparingly. But the value of molasses as a regular food is a comparatively recent discovery that will be hailed with a mixture of astonishment and pleasure. Love of the old black molasses was supposed to be confined chiefly to man, especially the darkies of the south, who delight in them as sop for their corn bread and roll their white eyes in glee as they swallow the toothsome morsel. If, also, they are adapted to the horse and are able to resuscitate broken-down animals, raising the very dead to life as it were, it is evident that something of great value has been added to our knowledge of foods."
