A newspaper correspondent at Washington sends out a report relative to the Kinkaid homestead law—which will be interesting to a large number of REPUBLICAN readers—as follows:

The so-called Kinkaid homestead bill, which brought comfort to hundreds of intending settlers in the western Nebraska district and which has largely been taken advantage of by farmers in that section, has had a series of ups and downs in the land office, which its author, Moses P. Kinkaid, proposes to rectify if it is in his power.

Give Unto Them That are Needy.

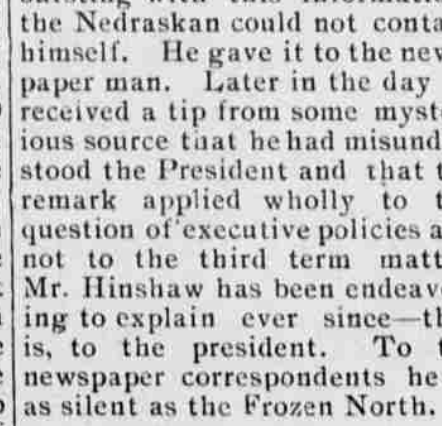
