New forms of applications for Homestead Entry, Soldier's Ad-ditional Homestead Entry, Des-ert Land Entry and for Timber or Stone Sworn Statements, Timber or Stone Final Proofs, and Yearly Proof in Desert Land cases, have been adopted, and on and after March 1, 1908, no entries will be allowed in the class of cases above mentioned, unless executed upon the new official forms, or upon forms which are the exact duplicates thereof, both as to wording, arrangement and size. Each of said forms is a combination of the several forms and affidavits formerly required to be filed in such cases.
