SON OF JOHN BROWN

CELEBRATES 85TH BIRTHDAY NEAR AKRON, O.

Only Surviving Child of Famous Abolitionist Still in Vigorous Health-Fought with Father at Battle of Osawatomie.

Akron, O .- Jason Brown celebrated his eighty-fifth birthday at his home, four miles west of this city, the other day. > Jason Brown was with his father in the Kansas warfare, and he carried arms at Osawatomie. He believed in his father and had faith in the cause of freedom. The hanging of his father and the slaughter of his brothers and other relatives made him something of a recluse and a wanderer until a few years ago, when advancing age caused him to settle down. He took up his residence here on the farm conducted by his son.

The birthplace of Jason Brown was in Hudson village, this county, not more than 15 miles distant from the place on which he now makes his home. He was the eldest of 20 children. His father, John Brown, descended from Purltan stock, was a stern man, and succeeded in instilling into the members of his family faith in himself and enthusiasm in behalf of the cause to which he felt bound by divine appointment.

After a varied experience in the vicinity of Akron and later in New York, where John Brown undertook the supervision of a colony of liberated slaves, the Browns were attracted to Kansas. There a vast territory had just been opened up to settlement, and there was fierce rivalry among the settlers as to whether it should be considered as a slave-holding territory or free country. In part it was the controversy that drew them, and then, in addition, there was the hope that they might prosper in the new country. So John Brown, with



his numerous sons and sons-in-laws and their families, removed to Kansas in the early '50s and settled near Osawatomie

Ardent abolitionists and making no concealment of their principles, they were soon singled out by proslavery neighbors for abuse and persecution. Their crops were destroyed. Their building were burned. A son, Frederick, was murdered on the public highway, and another member of the family was driven hopelessly insone by ernel treatment while a prisoner in the hands of their enemies.

Finally, one night in May, 1856, John Brown led a little band of free soldlers against the settlement of Osawatomic. In his band were several of his children and other relatives.

This night attack became known as the massacre of Osawatomic.

Jason Brown was not in the first fight, but he bore arms under his father at the battle of Osawatomie, which came as a sequel, in August of the same year. And he remembers that he killed his man.

After Osawatomie, John Brown and his family returned east. The father was determined to prepare for his later raid on Harper's Ferry, which he was convinced would mean an uprising that would set all the slaves free Jason did not join him, however. He had had enough of war.

The fact that his life was saved by a Kentuckian, when he had been captured and was about to be hanged, had a softening effect on the heart of Jason Brown. He no longer hated the


Jason Brown is still vigorous, A short time ago he made a trip to Puiin-Bay to visit the aged widow of his brother John, Jr. In the summer time he busies himself about the farm, hoes in the garden or takes long walks down the winding country roads. His dog, Wolf, was his companion for years, but Wolf died recently and the old man now has to walk alone.

At Jason Brown's home are many relies of the early days in Kansas and at Harper's Ferry. Among them all the thing he prizes most highly is an old fron wash basin made by his father many years ago at Meadville, Pa. Not only ded his father make it with his own zands, but the old basin made the trip to Kansas and was in the battle of Osawatomie, where water carried in it was used to bathe the wounds of the injured. It has been through three fires, and is badly eracked and disfigured, but that makes it only the more valuable in the

IMMIGRATION FROM SOUTH EXPECTED

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 9, 1908.-Present indications are that the Canadian Northwest will draw an exceptionally heavy movement of new settlers from the United States this year. It should surpass the banner record for 1907. This is not only based on the fact that the Americans have come to realize generally that the Canadian Northwest offers splendid opportunities, but also because the railroads have awakened to the fact and are offering rates to the Canadian Northwest which are exceptionally favor-

The lines which lead to St. Paul from the east and south are offering homeseekers' rates to the Canadian Northwest this year which are on a parity with those in existence to the southwest for a couple of seasons.

The weather throughout Western Canada has been remarkably good this year. A telegram from the winter wheat belt of Southern Alberta dated at Cardston, Alberta, January 29th, says:

"This winter up to January 25 was nothing short of a marvel, in fact, it was the finest anyone can remember for twenty-five years though there have been others nearly as good. The days were fine, sunny and warm with light frosts at night. Overcoats and gloves, etc., were discarded by most people in the day time. There was so little frost in the ground that post heles could be dug without any trouble after the first inch was broken through. Winter wheat remained fresh and green although there has been no snow since the September storm. If there is an early spring, winter wheat should gain a great

Amongst the reports of the yield of last year the following extracts are

H. Howe, of Magrath, Alta, writing on November, 1907, says: "I have 70 acres in crop, 50 acres of wheat and seven acres of oats. My average yield of oats was 35 bushels to the acre, and of wheat 45 bushels. The value to me was \$35 per acre."

J. F. Haycock, of Magrath, writes in November: "I had 65 acres in winter wheat, which went 60 bushels to the acre; oats averaged 80 bushels. 1 also had 12 tons of hay worth \$10 per ton. I got 600 bushels of potatoes from three acres of land; 1 got eight tons per acre from five acres of sugar beet."

J. F. Bradshaw, of Magrath, had 1,030 acres of winter wheat last year which averaged 3914 bushels to the feature of the millennium he pictures | acre. The value of his farm products Newspapers, he per acre was: Wheat, \$31.60; oats, \$11.20 and barley, \$25.15.


