Methodist preacher. In that campaign Lincoln made his first political speech. It was delivered from a wagon in the street of the village of Popps-ville, in Sangamon county. The speech was very short; but like all of Lincoln's speeches, it was sincere and direct.

This is what Lincoln said:

Gentlemen and Fellow Citizens: presume you all know who I am. I am humble Abraham Lincoln. I have been solicited by my many friends to become a candidate for the legislature. My politics are short and sweet. I am in favor of a national bank. I am in favor of the international improvement system and a high protective tariff. These are my sentiments and my political principles. If elected I shall be thankful; if not, it
