### Who Created the Pension System?

Nearly all Union veterans vote with the party of Lincoln and Grant, the party which created and maintained the pension system under which nearly four thousand million dollars have been paid out to survivors of the Union armies and to the widows and orphans of soldiers who have passed away. It may interest Union veterans to know that the Democratic state of Virginia discriminates against them by exempting from the poll tax as a prerequisite to vote those only who served in the army or navy of the Confederacy, no similar exemption being provided for Union soldiers, of whom there are many in the State. This is quite a recent change in the Constitution of Virginia, having gone into force in 1904, when the American people showed what they thought of Democratic rule in Nation and State by piling up a record-breaking majority for Roosevelt and Fairbanks. There is every indication that Taft and Sherman will be borne to success on another tidal wave, and survivors of the Union armies, who still number a very large proportion of the electorate, will undoubtedly vote for the Republican party, which has always stood by the veterans and against the party which holds the Union soldier to be less worthy of the ballot than the former Confederate.

## THE CARLAND MURDER TRIAL

BOTH SIDES ABLY HANDLED BY STRONG LEGAL TALENT.

### LONG LIST OF WITNESSES TESTIFY IN THE CASE.

The Court Room Was Filled With Interested Inspectors Each Session.

The Carland murder trial was commenced Monday morning. The first day and half was consumed in impaneling the jury. Examining the witnesses occupied the time of the court up to 11 a. m. today. The argument of the attorneys was continued up to 5:30 p. m. when adjournment was taken until 8:30 tomorrow morning.

The attorneys for the state are C. L. Gutterson, J. R. Dean and N. T. Gadd.

The attorneys for the defendant are Sullivan & Squires and Judge Sinclair.

The case has been one of unusual interest, the court room being crowded each session.

The case will not go to the jury much before noon tomorrow as Judge Sullivan and Judge Gutterson, each have their pleas to make to the jury.

### The Game Law.

Below are a few abstracts from the game laws of this state which are published by Geo. L. Carter, state game warden. The open season for ducks, geese, snipes, doves and plover begins September 15 and closes April 10. Prairie chicken and grouse season opens September 15 and closes December 1. The open season for quail is the shortest, from the 15th of November to December 1. The bag limit for one day is 25 birds, 10 geese and 50 other birds may be in your possession at one time except that but 10 chicken or grouse may be in your possession at one time during the month of September. Penalties for killing or having any game bird out of season \$5 each. For shipping game unaccompanied a fine of \$50 may be imposed also \$5 for each bird shipped. Selling game at any season \$5 for each bird sold. It is always unlawful to shoot song or insectivorous birds, to hunt upon lands of another without permission, to hunt without license except in the county of actual residence, to ship game unless accompanied by the owner, to pursue game in any manner during the closed season, to sell game in any manner.

### A Fine Squash.

The U. S. Land Office of this city has on exhibition a Golden Hubbard Squash received by D. M. Amsberry from T. R. Hewett of Mullen that weighs 56 pounds. Those who question the fertility of the sand hill country are invited to call at the office and see this fine specimen and have their doubts removed. Mr. Hewett, the donor is a native of Custer county and is a graduate of the Broken Bow high school. He is now a successful ranchman and farmer in Hooker county.
