BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

It was moved and carried that the report of the committee be accepted and adopted as read.

We recommend that the within petition be granted and damages allowed as follows:

To W. N. Bray \$150.00 to be levied against road district No. 1, Algemern twp.

And as follows on the petition of C. W. Gestwite, et al, for a change in road No. 825, in township 15, range 19:

We recommend that the petition be granted and the Surveyor be directed to make the survey.

And as follows upon the petition of H. H. Andrews, et al, for a road in township 15, range 23:

We recommend that the petition be granted.

And upon the petition of A. L. Morgan, et al, for the establishment and vacation of a road in township 13, range 19:

We recommend that the within petition be granted and damages allowed as follows:

To Leighton Flock \$224.00 for fence and \$35.00 for stock chute, said road to be 40 feet wide, said damage to be levied against road district No. 3 Loup township

And as follows upon the petition of N. M. Morgan, et al, for the establishment and vacation of a road in township 16, range 23:

We recommend that the within petition be granted and vacation be rejected, and the surveyor directed to survey and plat same.

And as follows upon the petition of Otto Shaller et al, for a road in township 16, range 24.

We recommend that the petition be granted and damages allowed as follows:

To J. E. Woodward \$50 to be levied against road district No. 2, Triumph twp., and to Ben Beecher \$225 to be levied against road dist. No. 2, Triumph twp.

And as follows upon the petition of B. L. Hopkins, et al, for the vacation of a part of roads No. 46 and 186.

We recommend that the petition be rejected.

We also recommend that the claim of A. C. Griffith for \$110.00 and of J. A. Evans for \$100.00 caused by the location of section line road known as the C. C. S'erner road passed by the board at its June 17th 1908 meeting, be allowed against road dist. No. 3 Triumph twp and we further recommend that the width of said road be 40 feet.

And in the matter of the claim of Nathaniel Hoover for damages caused by the location of the W. R. Tonnant road in T. 15, R. 19, we recommend that the claim be allowed as follows:

\$126 for fence, \$8 for cattle chute and \$81 for land to be levied against road dist. No. 3 Ansley twp.

And in the matter of the claims for damage caused by the location of the Wesley Thomas road in T. 17, R. 21 we recommend that the claim of Chas. L. Bennett as damage to the E 1/2 of the E 1/2 of sec 31, T. 17, R. 21 for \$150 be allowed for \$25 for moving fence against road dist. No. 4, Kilfoit twp.

And that the claim of J. R. Longfellow for \$50 caused by the location of the Wesley Thomas road in T. 17, R. 21 be allowed for moving fence \$25.

And that the claims of E. Morford, E. E. Hogoboom and Geo. Palmer be rejected for the reason that the road has been traveled for more than ten years.

And that the claim of T. T. Varney for \$100 caused by the location of road petitioned for by W. S. Mattley et al, in T. 16, R. 18, be allowed for \$60 against road dist. No. 2, Ansley twp.

And that the claim of Wm. Robinson for \$30 caused by the location of the Lewis Kimberling road in T. 17, R. 25 be allowed against road dist. No. 1 of Arnold twp.

And that the claim of Geo. Olsen for \$100 caused by the location of the Lewis Kimberling road in T. 17, R. 25, we recommend that the claim be allowed as follows; \$60 for fencing, \$20 for damage to school lease, and \$20 to the state for damage to school land.

And that the claim of Edla Malm for \$140, caused by the location of the R. Wilson road in T. 17, R. 18, be allowed for \$75 to be levied against road dist. No. 1, Westerville twp.

We also recommend that the petition of Jos. Gilmore et al for a road in T. 14, R. 23 be granted.
