DEMOCRATS HAVING TROUBLE

as to its opinion of Senate methods in dealing with bills sent over from the House, and in a resolution introduced by Leigray of Otoe, said some unpleasant things about the Senate. The resolution recited that the Senate had departed from the beaten paths of parliamentary practices and has shown a discourtesy to this House in refusing to either concur in or to non-concur in the House amendments to Senate File No. 133, the physical valuation bill, and proceeded to request that the Senate either concur in or reject the House amendments. The resolution being objected to by a member, goes over into the next legislative day before it can be voted on, but there is little doubt, from the temper of the House, that it will be passed.

The proceedings of Friday bring out in startling colors the fact of the lack of the singleness of purpose in the Democratic majority in this legislature, that, while posing as the instrument of reform in the hands of the people its actual leaders are not in sympathy with these proposed reforms, and that legislation of this character will be blocked to the limit of corporate power to do so.

Unless the bill is forced to passage by the indignant Democrats of the House, its chance for becoming a law is indeed slender. The Republican minority of the Senate favor it, but are powerless to act unless the Democratic majority bring it to the front.

The Democratic majority in the House has shown extreme generosity in the matter of normal schools, having approved three bills for schools of that character appropriating \$35,000 for a normal at Ainsworth, in Brown county, \$25,000 for a normal in the Northwestern section of the state, and in the latter days of past week agreed to the purchase of the private normal at Wayne, Neb., at a price of \$90,000. All these bills can hardly expect to receive the approval of the Senate, and prediction is made that in all probability the normal appropriations of this session will be limited to the purchase of the Wayne school.

A bill for the regulation of stock yards charges, H. R. 145, by Taylor of Hitchcock, is resting quietly in the Senate, and lacks evidence of enjoying anything of a vigorous existence. The bill does not reduce the charges for feed, but does deal with carriage charges, cutting down to the minimum the maximum charge for carload lots.
